

Reflection for Second Sunday of Advent

Peace is the second of Christ-like virtues we are to more intentionally contemplate and reflect within the season of Advent. Many might associate this peace with being free from wars, conflicts, or everyday difficulties or trials. Or that which comes with the assurance of worldly security and stability. There is of course also that transitory inner stress-free peace that we often find ourselves longing, especially after a hard day at the office, or when the kids are on holidays. And then there is that paradoxically different kind of peace which we can experience and acquire when having to endure times of difficulty, hardships, and various trials. When once again traversing those wilderness times. Where no matter the chaos going on around us, we are filled with a spiritual security, an assurance, the hope that in the end, God is with us and will not abandon us. With the added bonus of more powerfully growing us into Christlikeness. Through Christ and in the power of the Holy Spirit.

When we consider that Advent centres on preparing for our Lord's return, the Parousia, and the pre-empting end times, or Apocalypse, this type of peace is validly desirable. Knowing that we are forgiven, made righteous with God. Empowered to then endure the end times of trial if required. That's if we believe in a future eventuality of an Apocalypse, given so much of the world seems to always be under some form of tyranny, upheaval, or devastation. That said, the peace of Christ serves to bring us back into righteous relationship with God too. And from which all

forms of genuine peace ultimately derive. As opposed to the temporary superficial worldly peace to which we can only ever momentarily escape via any form of illusion or distraction. And which as we can all attest, never really lasts. Rather than one resulting from right relationship with God. This again is the peace that Christ gives, (and) not as the world gives (John 14:27). As within the allegorical text from Isaiah 11:1-10.

Alluding to a probable end time future where leonine savagery and scorpion tyranny would be no more, Isaiah takes a breather from condemning the failures of Israel's elect, and to whom his imagery could arguably infer, and turns his hand to encouraging those afflicted by such failures. Failure to repent. Failure to instil justice, righteousness, and equality. For the poor, the meek, and the children. And those, like Isaiah, who had sought to at least try and live by God's expectations. Being just, and righteous, and open to sharing. And which also entails recognizing that being less than perfect, we often can't do properly anyway. At least not without God's help. And admitting we need God's help. This is true humility. And imperative to true repentance. As is confessing our failures and seeking God's forgiveness as we genuinely seek to turn from our old ways. Whilst more intentionally seeking God's.

Repentance was just as imperative to the Israelites and Jews, as it is for Christians. It is a necessary part of restoration back into righteous relationship with God. As John the Baptist was at pains to encourage his Jewish audiences and crowds back in the day when he was called to prepare God's people for the advent of their Messiah. The coming of the Kingdom of God, the shoot or branch from Jesse's stump into the world. To date, the first truly and only genuine Parousia. And through whom all who believe in, would be baptised with the Holy Spirit and fire. The fire of enlightenment and purification (John 16:13). And the breath of life and power (Ezekiel 37:5; 2 Timothy 1:7). And through whose power, as Paul says, we can as both Gentile and Jew, enter into the peace of God, with the certain hope, that we have eternity in Christ. Whether in the here and now. At the end times. Or at the Advent of our Lord.
