## Reflection for Christ the King

While The Feast of Christ the King is celebrated today by most orthodox expressions of faith such as the Catholic, Reformed and Protestant denominations, it is actually a more recently instituted festival. Introduced by Pope Pius XI in 1925 as a way of celebrating not only a new Christian feast, particularly in light of countering the increasing secularism that had arisen as a result of the carnage and brutality of WWI, but also as a way of honouring Jesus as Lord and King over everything. That is in all of creation, for whom and through whom everything is made and is ultimately subject (1 Corinthians 15:26; Colossians 1:16; Hebrews 2:10). The feast is also an important way of closing the liturgical year. Because everything from each yearly Advent to subsequent Advent ultimately culminates in the person and Godhead of Jesus Christ. And what Christ as the second person of the Trinity accomplished for all humanity and creation on the Cross. Eternal salvation and reconciliation with the one and only true living God.

The caveat of course is whether we chose to accept as much or not. As was demonstrated by the disparity of responses between the two criminals who were executed either side of Jesus. One disbelieving and so unrepentant and disparaging. And the other, penitently willing to acknowledge Jesus as his Messiah, in the context of the injustice of Jesus' crucifixion compared to the criminal's own unworthiness. Even more astounding, that Jesus prayed for God to forgive those responsible for His demise. For they apparently weren't aware of what they were actually doing. Meaning they weren't fully culpable. Despite all the taunting, derision, humiliation, and outright cruelty.

No doubt why as His disciples, we can't be reminded enough of the imperative to forgive too. Because none of us are capable of being fully free from the curse of sin with all its inherent baggage. Including unforgiveness. Especially in light of confronting and overcoming the ongoing struggles of our fleshly inclinations, as we progress through the daily journey of purification. Not that that denigrates or gives cause to despise our frail human bodies, God's Temple, the Body of Christ either. To which Paul was attempting to counter when writing from prison to the Colossians.

Correcting perhaps yet another gnostic orientated fear-based heresy that we need to work at denying our physical and therefore irredeemable selves to attain perfection, lest we risk all manner of nefarious spiritual interference. And what better way to do so than reminding us all that Christ the King of everything was Himself born of a fully physical and so frail human body too. And that true spirituality comes as much, though perhaps even more, from engaging in the nitty grittiness of everyday human physical existence. Rather than striving the heights of spiritual enlightenment and conquest via esoteric knowledge and rituals. Such as caring once again for the unwanted and disadvantaged and challenging the corrupt practices inherent to our societies and communities. As Jeremiah promised God would one day bring to completion. To the glory of the one true God. To the glory of God's people. To the glory of Christ the King.
