Reflection for Third Sunday of Advent

As prophesied by both Isaiah (Isaiah 40:3-5) and Malachi (Mal 3:1; 4:5), when it came to preparing for the advent of the Messiah, the Parousia, and the imperative to repent and change from old ways, John the Baptizer was never one to pull any spiritual punches. Just as he vociferously challenged the corrupt behaviours of those in leadership who should have known better. No surprise therefore that he eventually ends up incarcerated. Alone, bewildered, and probably a tad concerned that things weren't looking particularly favourable. Little wonder he had a few lingering questions too. Most pressingly concerning whether Jesus actually was the Messiah after all. Remembering that John was still operating from the perspective of the Old Testament prophets. Such as Isaiah and Malachi.

Like most of his contemporaries John was expecting a Messiah, who apart from healing and redeeming, perhaps more importantly encompassed restoring national pride and reeking vengeance through military conquest. Understandable given the oppressively malignant regimes of Israel's past religious and political elite, many of whom had much to gain from accommodating their foreign occupiers. Which by the time of John meant the Romans. And others like the Sadducees who were in their pockets. For the Jew, there was no appreciation of the Cross event or that the Messiah would suffer. Just as there was no appreciation that the Messiah would actually conquer the entire world, Jew and Gentile alike, through the eternal power of love and sacrifice, rather than through the worldly power of might and retribution. And whilst John may have received some answers, it's most likely he died without ever being aware of the full reality of God's purposes. Perhaps even with a fearful (or racing) heart.

Like those to whom Isaiah was encouraging, as they no doubt were hoping and waiting patiently for release and justice. The reading from James also refers to patience. Patient suffering at the hands of the rich and exploitive, to whom he is also encouraging to do the right thing. Especially amongst and by their own. As with love and peace, patience is one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit. So too is joy.

Joy is also the third virtue we celebrate during Advent. If we consider the protagonists from all three readings, we can understand just how difficult it would have been to be, let alone remain joyful. John in prison awaiting the unknown, the poor and oppressed Israelites still suffering under corrupt leadership, and wealthy Christians mistreating lesser Christians. All afflicted. And yet all encouraged to hang in there. Patiently. Even if things got worse. And which is why through times of adversity, we once again have in a Saviour the Advent assurance of the promise that the day will indeed come, when everything will be restored. Where justice and righteousness and equality will be fully manifest. And where we will be all truly free to live in fearless harmony as one with God and each other. And why we have that reality available to us, living in us, in the here and now, the hope, peace, and joy of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.
